RESEARCH LEADS TO REAL-LIFE RESULTS


As students in the Geneva College Adult Degree Completion Program gain deeper knowledge of their field, they also have opportunities for real-life application.

The Applied Research Project (ARP) is a project that runs throughout the 17-month ADCP. Students are required to research a particular organization, identify an issue within the organization and propose a solution. Students who submit exemplary projects receive research honors and the opportunity to present at the ADCP Honors Symposium. In some cases, recognition also comes from beyond the classroom when students are honored by the organizations they have researched.

The students who presented at the Honors Symposium in May 2010, Carol Young and George Sherry, are proof that excellent scholarship can come to fruition in the office.

Carol Young, organizational development class 026, had researched sales training at Amerinet, a group purchasing organization for healthcare facilities. Carol is the manager of market research for Amerinet's subsidiary DataBay. Her ARP topic was born out of the realization that Amerinet field staff were not selling DataBay products. 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was due to an oversight in the training process and wanted to find out what could be done to make that training more beneficial to the company.

Her research brought to light issues in sales training that could be applied to Amerinet, as well as other companies. Pleased with her work, Dr. Jane Dotter, Carol's research instructor, suggested Carol apply for research honors. Not only did her project impress the faculty of the ADCP and achieve research honors, but the vice president of sales at Amerinet requested a copy of her project for his own edification and possibly the improvement of Amerinet.

The second Honors Symposium presenter was George Sherry from organizational development class 027 in Johnstown. He researched the performance of Lean Six Sigma at Indiana Regional Medical Center (IRMC) where he works as the community relations coordinator. Lean Six Sigma is a methodology designed to eliminate wasteful steps in all areas of business, making processes as fool-proof and effective as possible. At the beginning of the ADCP, George felt that Lean Six Sigma was losing effectiveness and decided to use the study of the process as his applied research project. To his surprise, he found that the Lean Six Sigma was providing IRMC with cost-effective value at every step, just as intended.

While George did not prove his hypothesis, he did earn recognition from his employer. Initially the medical center had hired trainers to come in to train groups of employees on the Lean Six Sigma process, but as a result of George's research and involvement, he was trained as the instructor.

"It is an honor to be recognized for 17 months of hard work," he says.


