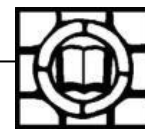


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This guide demonstrates bibliography entries when using footnotes or endnotes. Consult *The Chicago Manual of Style* for instructions on formatting notes or author-date style references.

A book with one author:

Sewell, William H. *A Rhetoric of Bourgeois Revolution: The Abbé Sieyès and "What Is the Third Estate?"* Duke University Press, 1994.

A book with several authors:

Elkins, Stanley, and Eric McKittrick. *The Age of Federalism*. Oxford University Press, 1993.

A book with author and editor:

Mackintosh, James. *Vindiciae Gallicae and Other Writings on the French Revolution*. Edited by Donald Winch. Liberty Fund, 2006.

An edited book:

Wasserman, Earl R., ed. *Aspects of the Eighteenth Century*. Johns Hopkins, 1965.

An article or chapter from an edited book:

Popkin, Jeremy D. "The Royalist Press in the Reign of Terror." In *The Rise and Fall of the French Revolution*, edited by T.C.W. Blanning. University of Chicago Press, 1996.

An article from a print periodical:

Andress, David. "The Shifting Landscape of Revolutionary Interpretations: A Death of the Past and a Rebirth of History?" *French Historical Studies* 32, no. 4 (2009): 647-653.

An article from an online database:

Hale, Matthew Rainbow. "On Their Tiptoes: Political Time and Newspapers during the Advent of the Radicalized French Revolution, circa 1792-1793." *Journal of the Early Republic* 29, no. 2 (2009): 191-218. <https://doi.org/10.1353/jer.0.0076>.

*If available, use the DOI. If there is not a DOI available, look for a stable URL, such as a "Permalink." Avoid copying the URL from the top of the browser.

A website:

Common reference books (e.g. *Encyclopaedia Britannica*) usually are not listed in the bibliography, but rather in notes.
